

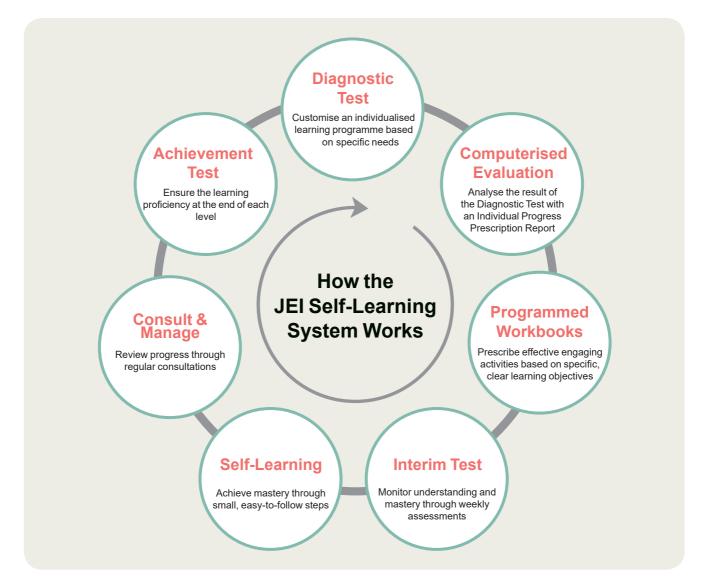

JEI Reading & Writing is a literaturebased enrichment program that reinforces reading comprehension and writing skills. Consisting of 40 weekly workbooks, each grade level features fiction and nonfiction literature as well as other genres of writing. Students in 2nd through 8th grade who possess basic language arts skills and are interested in exploring various literary genres are encouraged to enroll in the JEI Reading & Writing program.

Features of JEI Reading & Writing

- Exploring various types of literary genres through ten monthly units in each grade level.

- 5 Aligned with the State Standards, this unique reading program helps build critical thinking and analytical skills.


Building background and interest


